Papers Published and Under Review

- The Systemic Causes of Financial Crises in the 19th Century. *Business and Politics*, 2017
 - The hierarchical structure of the international economy during the first period of globalization in the long 19th century meant the financial conditions of Great Britain disproportionately influenced the economies of small countries both by spreading financial bubbles and financial crises. OLS evidence links credit conditions in Britain to large changes in external financial flows that act as a transmission mechanism for financial contagion.
- Hegemonic Instability: Complex interdependence and the dynamics of financial crises in the contemporary international system. *European Journal of International Relations*, 2021
 - The same dynamics that existed in the long 19th century exist in contemporary times as well. Credit and financial conditions in the US affect global liquidity, credit bubbles, and crises in other countries.
- The Evolving State of the State in IPE. *Oxford Handbook of International Political Economy*, 2021
 - This book chapter reviews the evolution of scholarly thinking about the nation state within the field of international political economy and proposes a new, more encompassing conception of the nation-state as a cross-section of the international political economy multiplex.
- Deindustrialization and the Demand for Protection (with Tyler Coleman). *Business and Politics*, 2021
 - We propose a new determinant of demand for anti-dumping petitions in the contemporary period—changes in the pattern of industrial production between developed and developing economies have contributed to deindustrialization in advanced economies and premature industrialization some developing countries.
- The “Nuclear Option” has Fizzled, Again Here’s Why and What to Do (with Terry Sullivan and Christian Cmehil-Warn). *Presidential Studies Quarterly*, 2020
 - We analyze the effect of Senate rule changes on the duration of Senate processing of federal appointments and show that the nuclear option has little or no effect.
- Presidential Leadership and Initiative in the Politics of Presidential Appointments (With Terry Sullivan and Brandon Schneider). *Congress and the Presidency*, 2021
 - We analyze the operational and political determinants of the Presidential appointments process from start

(identification by the president) to finish (Senate confirmation) using forty years of data, across six presidential administrations.

- Does Grand Theory Shape Officials' Speech? (*with Timothy McKeown*), *European Journal of International Relations* 2021
 - In what situations is the speech of foreign policy officials a reflection of speech expounding grand theories of International Relations? Using a linear support vector classification algorithm, we analyze all the published volumes of *Foreign Relations of the United States*, examining the use of five frames taken from academic theory and day-to-day practice: realism, geopolitics, liberalism, Cold War politics, and a pragmatic frame.
- Authoritarian Audiences: Explaining Subnational Variation in North Korean Propaganda (*with Sheena Chestnut Greitens and Yu Bin Kim*). *Under Review*
 - We develop and test a theory of subnational propaganda targeting by authoritarian regimes in the context of North Korea. We find that regimes engage in subnational targeting of propaganda to secure political survival: elites are more likely to receive co-optational messages, while masses receive mobilizational appeals.
- American Financial Hegemony, Global Capital Cycles, and the Macroeconomic Growth Environment (*with W. K. Winecoff*). *R & R Economics and Politics*, April 2022
 - We show that gross flow cycles are driven by developments in American financial markets, particularly the banking sector, which increase the volatility of economic growth throughout the world as a consequence of cross-border capital flows. We empirically evaluate this argument for a set of 102 countries from 1970-2011 and find substantial support.
- Reading the Tea Leaves: What International Investors Infer from Terrorism in the Midst of Civil War (*with Bryce Reeder and Tyler Coleman*) *Under Review*
 - Countries experiencing civil wars in which rebel groups resort to terrorism are less likely to be penalized by foreign investors than those experiencing more conventional civil wars.
- Explaining National Variation in Crypto Currency Adoption and Regulation (*with Omer Sen*) *Under Review*
 - Countries' regime type, exchange rate regime, and level of financial openness will dictate whether a country chooses to ban crypto technologies or co-opt them with a CBDC. Quantitative evidence from 135+ countries and case studies support this theory.
- Development, Transition, and Crisis in the International System 1870-2009. *Under Revision*
 - The structure and pattern of interdependency in the international economy (globalization) affects the prevalence and virulence of financial crises. Financial and trade linkages act as contagion channels, which help spread financial bubbles and crises. Network analysis and OLS statistical evidence provide empirical support for the theory.
- Structured Choice, Presidential Routine, and Foreign Policy Crises: A Comparative Analysis (*with Terry Sullivan*). *Under Revision*
 - The choices presidents make over the allocation of their time during foreign policy crises reveals the extent to which presidents are commonly constrained by unanticipated developments on the international stage, and also demonstrate their unique agency and approach to managing the office. Dirichlet regression using a unique dataset of daily presidential activities of eight U.S. presidents suggests there are consistencies and variation among presidents' foreign policy crisis management approaches.

Working Papers

- Has Political Polarization Increased the Frequency of Failed PAS Nominations in the Last 30 Years?
 - We take up this difficult task of identifying failed nominations by examining withdrawn and languishing nominations made in the first two years of the six presidential administrations from George H.W. Bush through Joseph Biden. We use news coverage to determine if and why the nominations failed to proceed to confirmation.
- The Effect of Foreign Policy Crises on the Evolution of Presidential Advisory Systems: The Case of Richard Nixon.
 - Existing studies of presidential advisory systems assume a static model of the system that persists throughout an entire administration. However, data from the presidential diary of Richard Nixon during the Pentagon Papers leak and the Yom Kippur crisis of 1973, which detail who Nixon actually spent time with, shows how crises can be an impetus for system reorganization.
- The Post-Crisis Evolution of the International Economic Multiplex, *With Elizabeth Menninga and W.K. Winecoff*.
 - We construct the first international economic multiplex using bilateral data on trade, portfolio investment, foreign direct investment, bilateral investment treaties, and preferential trade agreements for the post-crisis period and examine how the distribution of power within this network has changed in the last decade.
